WORSHIP GUIDE Hope Chapel Greensboro December 10, 2023



Advent is a word that means "coming" or "arrival." It is a four-week period in which the church looks back to Jesus' first coming as our Savior, and looks forward to His second coming as our Judge. Just as John the Baptist told the Jewish people to "prepare" for the Lord's coming, we need to encourage each other to be ready for His coming again, when He will fulfill God's promises and renew all things. Indeed, the kingdom of God will come "on earth as it is in heaven" - the wolf will lie down with the lamb, death will be swallowed up, the dead in Christ will rise to new life, and every tear will be wiped away. As Isaiah the prophet says, "Prepare the way for the Lord... The glory of the Lord will be revealed, and all people will see it together" (Isaiah 40:3-5).

Since the fourth century, the Church has celebrated this season of Advent, starting on the fourth Sunday before Christmas day. The celebration of Advent helps us focus our attention on Jesus Christ's birth and ministry as well as His promised return. Throughout the season we are constantly reminded that Jesus Christ is the Savior of the world.

The leader will end each section of the prayer by saying "Lord, in Your mercy..." and the congregation responds with "...Hear our prayer."

Scripture Reading

What do we do during the Scripture Reading? Because the Word of God is one of the chief means through which God has chosen to speak to us, it is a principle and direct way we "hear from God" in worship. The public reading of Scripture, then, is a sacred act that deserves our full attention and focus. Especially in our age, we must discipline ourselves to listen to readings for longer periods of time, for God's Word is food for our soul.
